THINKING BRIDGE - - By Eddie Kantar

Opening lead: ♦A. East plays the ♦3, standard attitude, and West shifts to the ♣Q. East encouraging. Spades are 2-1, Plan the play.

- 1. How would you play this contract at matchpoints?
- 2. How would you play at IMPs?

This contract should be played identically at both forms of scoring because the bidding has tipped you off that East has the ♥K. West, a passed hand, has already turned up with the ◆A K and the ◆Q J for 10 HCP. If West had the ♥K, he would have opened the bidding. Therefore, forget the heart finesse. You can't stand for East to win and ram a diamond through your queen.

Try this: Knowing that East has the ♥K and that East is the danger hand, you simply have to avoid the heart finesse! But how?

By ducking the ♣Q! Assuming West leads a second club, win the king, draw two rounds of trumps ending in dummy, discard a heart on the ♣A and play the ♥A, killing your queen, and then run the ♥J through East. Assume East covers. You ruff, cross to dummy with a spade and discard a diamond on the ♥10. Ten tricks: Six spades, two hearts and two clubs.

If East doesn't cover, discard a diamond and ruff a heart. If the king falls from East, you can ruff and make an overtrick, discarding your last diamond on the ♥10.

If East shifts to a heart at trick two, win the ace, cross to the ♣K, draw two rounds of trumps ending in dummy, discard the ♥Q on the ♣A, and run the ♥J as before.

You have at least 10 tricks if you stay away - far away - from an early heart finesse. That's what can go wrong. The full deal:

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
